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2019-20 Band Booster Fundraisers

Letter Writing Campaign – Within the first few weeks of school, students will be asked to send letters to friends and family members who may be willing to make donations to the J.H. Rose Band Program. The Band Boosters have chosen this option over selling products that return only a small percentage of sales to the program as profit. If each student could bring in \$75-\$100 from their donors, the program would raise well over \$10,000 for equipment and supplies. We will also look to secure the support of local businesses through this campaign. This project is replaced the labor intensive Band Classic that we held for eight years, but the proceeds will be distributed in the same fashion: 55% of the proceeds go towards instrument purchase/repair, 15% for the purchase of new music, 25% goes into savings for our uniform fund, and 5% for miscellaneous expenses.

Citrus Fruit Sale - For decades, the Rose High Band has been selling citrus fruit as a fundraiser. We typically take orders late October through mid-November and the fruit is delivered in early December straight from the Florida citrus orchards. Not only is this some of the best fruit you could eat, but it is sold at a very reasonable price. We have customers who have purchased our fruit for decades and look forward to this sale every year. The proceeds from this event help to fund the Annual Band Banquet, pay student event fees for county, district, and state band events, pay drivers and mileage for student travel to various band events, and help with instrument maintenance costs.

All-District Concessions - Every January, Rose High School is used as the site for the All-District Band Auditions. We typically have around 800 students from throughout the region on campus auditioning to be a part of the All-District Band. During their time here, we have a concession stand set up in the cafeteria to sell breakfast, lunch, drinks, and snacks. The proceeds from this event go to help fund various band student event fees, purchase music for festivals, and help pay for the various awards given at the Band Banquet.

Other Fundraising - While the three activities listed above take care of our annual operating expenses and allow the program to upgrade and repair inventory, we do occasionally hold other fundraisers with a specific purpose in mind (i.e. raise money for a Spring Trip).

Band Class Expectations:

- I. Respect all members of the class** including the teachers, other students, parent chaperones, guest conductors, interns, substitute teachers, etc.
- II. Respect all equipment in the room** including student instruments, school instruments, music stands, chairs, technology, etc. Therefore, please handle your own instrument only, do not lean on the stands, refrain from playing with the percussion equipment, etc.
- III. Arrive to class on time and ready to learn.** Therefore, bring all required materials, get ready quickly, and have a positive attitude.
- IV. Cell Phones are not to be seen or used in class.** Cell Phone storage will be offered and used as necessary to ensure minimal disruption. Phones will be kept until the end of day for the first offense, and surrendered to the front office for all others.
- V. Follow all classroom policies and procedures** such as those outlined in detail in this handbook.
- VI. Follow all rules found in the student/parent handbook.**
Make sure to read the J.H. Rose Student / Parent Handbook and the Pitt County Schools Code of Conduct very carefully.

Consequences:

Stage I: Verbal warning / Student Conference

Stage II: Parental Notification / Assignment to CHOICE for period / Detention / Administrative Referral

Stage III: Recommendation of In School Suspension (ISS) or Out of School Suspension (OSS)

Band Class Policies & Procedures

Class Materials:

Students are responsible for having the following materials in class daily:

Instrument: Band class is rather unproductive without one. If an instrument is in the shop for repair, we will need a note from a parent/guardian/repair shop. Also, if your instrument is being repaired, keep your mouthpiece and reeds so that you can use a school-owned instrument.

Music folder: We will provide all students with a folder to store any sheet music or other class materials that they may have. Do not rely on your stand partner to bring his/her music. Everyone will need to mark corrections on their own parts so that practice can be done effectively. ***Music folders should go home with you so you may practice, not stay on a shelf in the band room or storage room (Percussion!)***

Notebook: In order to create ensemble goals and reflect on our progress we will be completing writing assignments throughout the year.

Pencil: Students will need a pencil to correct notes, write in fingerings, take notes, and take tests. It would be a good idea to keep a pencil in your folder or in your case.

Failure to bring these items will result in a lowering of your weekly participation grade. (See **Grading Policy**)

Instrument Storage:

- ❖ Students may bring instruments to the band instrument storage room before school begins. Instruments should be placed on the shelves in an orderly fashion and **must have a nametag**.
- ❖ All instruments should be picked up from the band room by 4:00 PM. **No instrument may be left in the band room overnight** for liability reasons. Also, students should understand that they are expected to be practicing frequently to ensure that they are prepared for class.
- ❖ Failure to abide by the instrument storage policy may result in temporary or permanent loss of storage privileges.

Maintaining Instruments:

- ❖ Students must provide their own valve oil, reeds, mouthpiece, drum sticks, etc. Even students using school-owned instruments need to provide supplies.
- ❖ Each student is responsible for keeping his/her instrument in good working condition. This means: clean mouthpiece, tuning slides greased and movable, valves oiled, and clarinet/sax corks greased.
- ❖ Remember, Band Class **is not** the time to clean and maintain your instrument. This should be taken care of at home. If a minor problem occurs during class (i.e. a valve sticks), go ahead and take care of the problem quickly with as little disruption as possible.
- ❖ If your instrument has a serious problem at any point, ask us about it immediately. We may be able to fix it and save you time and money from the repair shop. If we can't repair it, please get it to the repair shop immediately so that you can have it back in class as soon as possible.

Percussion Equipment:

- ❖ No student should be near the percussion equipment, except for the percussionists.
- ❖ No student, including the percussionists, should play the percussion instruments before or after class/school.
- ❖ Large percussion equipment will be stored in the back of the classroom. Before each class, percussionists have the responsibility of getting their section set up before rehearsal begins. In the same manner, at the end of each class, percussionists have the responsibility of putting all equipment back in its proper place of storage.
- ❖ All small percussion equipment and mallets will be stored in the designated cabinets on the side of the room. It is imperative that all of this equipment be put back into the proper places of storage at the end of every class.

Starting Class:

- ❖ All students must be in the band room when the bell rings for their class to begin. School policy is very clear about the tardy policy. (Check your Parent/Student Handbook to clarify any questions about tardiness.)
- ❖ Due to the time that is necessary to put instruments together, students will have two minutes after the tardy bell rings to get prepared. If students are not ready at this point, they will begin to lose participation points.
- ❖ Any individual warm-up that occurs during the first two minutes of class should be done properly. Lip slurs, long tones, and scales are some acceptable warm-up activities. Remember that the warm-up process serves a physical purpose and improper warm-up can result in damage to your embouchure muscles.

Ending Class:

- ❖ Students will remain seated and on task until the teacher verbally dismisses class. This policy ensures that all important announcements made at the end of class are heard. Students can be assured that we will provide enough time to put instruments away. (The bell is **not** the determining factor that ends class.)
- ❖ Make sure to return the chairs and stands to an organized state before you leave the classroom. Also, make sure to put all instruments and equipment away in the proper places. This includes school-owned instruments and all percussion equipment.
- ❖ Students will not be given tardy passes to be late to their next class.
- ❖ The final class of the day will be expected to stack chairs and organize stands before leaving for the day.

REFRESH:

- ❖ Students are expected to use Refresh time wisely (e.g. practicing, homework for other classes, etc.). There will be no eating or drinking in the band room or practice rooms and all doors without windows are to remain open.

Marching Rampant Information

Rehearsals:

- ❖ Rehearsals for the Marching Rampants will be from 3:45-6:15 on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, & Thursdays. There will be some exceptions to this when we have home games or other band activities that interfere. On game days, we will stay all afternoon until the game. All necessary equipment will need to come to school in the morning on game Fridays. (***See the Marching Rampant Schedule***)
- ❖ **Attendance at ALL rehearsals is mandatory.** The only excused absences will be because of severe illness or family emergency. If you are going to miss a rehearsal, let Mr. Howard or Ms. Park know as early as possible. Please e-mail if you are extremely sick and cannot attend. **DO NOT** send messages through other band members!!!
- ❖ Please remember that you are enrolled for class credit. Unexcused absences will lower your participation grade, even if you are auditing this class.

Performances:

- ❖ **Attendance at ALL performances is required!!!** Football games, parades, competitions, clinics, etc. are all required activities for every member of the band. Failure to attend a performance could result in your dismissal from the band and receiving an “F” for the class grade. If a family emergency arises, let Mr. Howard or Ms. Park know as soon as possible so that arrangements can be made.

Expectations:

- ❖ All members of the Marching Rampants are expected to follow the policies for membership even if they are auditing the class. We can only be successful if everyone comes to rehearsals and commits to the performances. By missing a rehearsal or performance, you are letting down everyone else in the band. Check all dates for the season on the enclosed schedule for events and clear your schedules accordingly.
- ❖ The Marching Rampants will need to continue rehearsals and performances if the football team makes the playoffs.

Concert Attire:

Concert/Symphonic Band: Boys and Girls should wear black dress pants (NO skirts), black socks, black dress shoes, and a white collared dress shirt/blouse. Boys should also wear a solid black bow tie.

Wind Ensemble: Boys and Girls should wear black dress pants (NO skirts), black socks, black dress shoes, and a black collared dress shirt/blouse.

Jazz Band: Attire will vary based on the nature of the performance, however, we will order matching polo shirts to be worn with khaki or black dress pants.

*Failure to abide by the concert dress code could result in dismissal from the performance. Students dismissed for inappropriate concert dress **will not** be given a chance to make up their performance grade.*

daily participation grades where each day, students earn:

10 points for having instrument
5 points for having all music
5 points for having a pencil
Totals 20 points/day x 5 days = 100 points/week

If students are not actively participating throughout the entire class, points will be deducted accordingly.

In rare cases, students may be removed from the room if they refuse to participate (sent to CHOICE).

Honors Credit Requirements:

Students that are enrolled in Honors Symphonic Band or Honors Wind Ensemble (extra quality ½ point for GPA) must:

- 1.) Must be enrolled in a band class year-round.
- 2.) Must begin the year knowing all NC Honors Band scales from memory for their previous grade level (ie. 9th graders must know Middle School scale requirements, 11th must know 9/10 scales)
- 3.) Must successfully prepare the All-District Audition materials (major scales, chromatic scales, and solo) and should plan to participate in the auditions in January.
- 4.) Must complete more rigorous demands on many assignments throughout the year.
- 5.) Must participate as a soloist or ensemble member in at least one of the JHR Chamber Music Recitals.

Course Descriptions:

Honors Wind Ensemble: The Wind Ensemble is the most advanced performance organization in the J.H. Rose Band Program. Participation in this ensemble is by audition only. All students enrolled in this advanced level course will receive honors credit. This ensemble will work to refine technical skills, develop a high level of musicality, and study a wide variety of advanced repertoire for the wind band. Aside from these performance goals, students will also be exposed to various concepts of music theory and work to understand music history as it relates to the music studied in class. This ensemble will perform a minimum of five times during the course of the year.

Concert Band/Honors Symphonic Band: The Concert Band is open to all interested students who have participated in band during their middle school years. While this ensemble will perform frequently (at least five times), there will be an increased focus on development of technique, tone production, and musical sensitivity. This ensemble will also provide students a comfortable setting where they can develop skills on a secondary instrument in order to help the instrumentation of the band program. The expectation of *individual student growth* will be a key factor in determining grades on all playing exercises. Students that demonstrate that they are already at the “Proficient” level of performance will be enrolled in the Honors Symphonic Band section of this course and have more rigorous standards.

Jazz Bands (Blue-Honors & Green): The J.H. Rose Jazz Bands will provide students with the opportunity to expand their musical training through learning about the jazz idiom. Both Jazz Bands will be offered as yearlong early bird classes (7:30-8:15am). All students in these ensembles will receive class credit unless an audit waiver is signed. These ensembles will have a set instrumentation and members will be selected based on interest, seniority, and playing ability. Students may only participate in this ensemble if they are involved in another ensemble during the school day. (Exceptions will only be made in the case of incomplete instrumentation.) A variety of jazz and popular music styles will be covered in this class. Performance opportunities vary year to year, however, frequent performances can be expected and are not all included in this book because they come up on shorter notice.

Marching Rampants: The J.H. Rose Marching Rampants provide entertainment at all home football games and select away games. This ensemble will also work to prepare a show that will be presented at Band Competitions during the fall semester. Other performance opportunities will include parades, pep rallies, and select community events. **ALL** students that participate in the Marching Rampants will take it for class credit, unless an audit waiver is signed. *Attendance and participation in rehearsals will be a key factor in grading.* (See **Marching Band section** of this handbook for more details on performance dates and member expectations.)

Performance Information

It is important to remember that all band classes are taken for a class credit. The Pitt County Registration Guide for High School Students makes it very clear that students are required to attend **all** public performances in order to get credit for these classes. Therefore, **excused absences from the following performances will only be granted in the case of a death in the immediate family or extreme illness documented with a doctor's note.** The following concert dates must take precedence over extra-curricular activities. It should also be noted that a major test grade (double the weight of other test grades) will come from each performance.

Students are required to be present for the full duration of each concert. Part of the value of these performances is the learning that occurs from hearing other ensembles. It is also an expectation that members of the J.H. Rose Band Program support one another in their endeavors.
